SOLEMN REQUIEM AT BREMERTON FOR JOS. MATZ

Survived by Six Children;
Two of Which Are
Nuns

BREMERTON, March 7. — A High Mass of Requiem was sung Wednesday morning at Star of the Sea Church in Bremerton for the repose of the soul of Joseph S. Matz, who died at his home in Bremerton Monday, February 29. The Rev. Father Camerman was celebrant. The remains were taken to St. Joseph's Church, Ferndale, where a High Mass of Requiem again was celebrated Thursday morning by Rev. Father Duggan, with Rev. Dean Barrett of Bellingham, a former pastor of the deceased, present.

The remains were laid to rest in the family plot at Enterprise Cemetery. Mr. Matz was a charter member of the Knights of Columbus Council in Bellingham, where he formerly resided.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ida Matz; two sons and four daughters, Joseph and Ignatius, Ann and Agnes at home, Sister M. Dolorosa, a teacher at Holy Rosary, Seattle; Sister M. Angeline, Marymount, Tacoma; by his father, Jacob Matz; a sister, Mrs. T. P. Reilly; a brother, Albert, all of Ferndale.

Whatcom County Pioneer Buried Monday Morning

LYNDEN. — Jacob Matz, one of the first six men to begin farming operations in Whatcom County in 1873 was buried from St. Joseph's Church, Ferndale, last Monday. The Rev. Father Duggan celebrated the Requiem and interment followed at Enterprise Cemetery.

Mr. Metz came to Washington Territory from Minnesota in 1872 and filed on a Ferndale homestead in 1873. He was 65 years old. Mr. Matz was awarded the Old Settlers Cup by the Whatcom County Old Settlers' Association. He was a former president and trustee of the Old Settlers' Association.

Survivors are Mrs. Josephine Reilly, his daughter, and Albert Matz, his son. He also leaves three brothers, Joseph, Andrew and Ignatius Matz, seventeen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Sister Mary Angeline Matz, OP

SEATTLE — Tacoma Dominican Sister Mary Angeline (Frances) Matz died Dec. 9 at St. Joseph Residence. She was 89, and had been a member of her community for 66 years.

A Bellingham native, Sister Matz attended schools staffed by the Tacoma Dominicans. In religious life she served as infirmarian and housekeeper at various houses of her congregation, including Aquinas Academy and St. Leo in Tacoma; Lourdes Academy in Ellensburg; and St. Mary Convent in Centralia.

According to a spokeswoman for her community, Sister Matz "had a deep devotion to the Sacred Heart and to Mary, Mother of God."

She is survived by several nieces, nephews and cousins. She was preceded in death by five brothers and sisters, including Dominican Sister Mary Dolorosa.
